Elements of Novel Text Structure

Are you wondering what to expect when you read a novel? Novels will often follow a similar structure, often called Freytag's Pyramid. Within this structure, the novel will begin with an <u>exposition</u>, or the beginning of the story where the characters, setting, and world are introduced. It will then introduce the <u>inciting incident</u>, or conflict in the story. This problem will continue (or even get worse!) during the <u>rising action</u>. The story will peak during the <u>climax</u> where you'll learn the fate of the characters, with a "new normal" emerging in the <u>falling action</u>. The writer will tie up loose ends in the <u>resolution</u>.

Comprehension Tips

Use graphic organizers: These tools can help you keep track of each part of the novel. As you read, jot quick notes on who the characters are and what is happening in each part of the story.


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<u>Make predictions</u>: Authors will often give clues to foreshadow what may happen next. Pay attention to the dialogue, changes in characters' behavior, and the characters' emotions, which may be helpful hints.
